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Gomonshu Visit By Rev. Dr. Kenji Akahoshi, Resident Minister

I have been at two family weddings where I encountered old friends and inquired how they were related to the wedding couple. We then realized that the wedding now connected us as

relatives. Because of causes and conditions beyond our awareness, we had expanded our family connections to include friends who were previously not related. The realization of this new connection had me appreciate these old friends and new relatives in a new light.

I had a similar sense in meeting the Gomonshu Ohtani Kojun, who is the 25th descendent of Shinran. Shinran, his teachings, and Shin Buddhism have been like an old friend who has influenced me my entire life. Now, actually meeting and talking with this true relative of Shinran, made me feel an actual connection with this historical figure. The *Kyogyoshinsho, wasans*, and other writings were embodied in this kind, cordial, and wise young man. I felt really connected and related to Shinran and his teachings through my interactions with this living human being.

How does this transition from friend to family occur? How is meeting the Gomonshu different from any other meeting of a stranger? It happens in our minds. We might technically draw a family tree to validate this connection. But, the more meaningful and real relationship occurs in our minds. I think Buddhism is a guide to cultivate our minds and hearts to develop a true relationship with those whom we might feel little connection. We are all connected, even though we may not be aware of our relationship.

We are all interdependent. *Anatman* is the Sanskrit word that denies that entities exist separately. The notion that I am an independent and separate person, is what leads me into conflicts and problems. We might call this a **virtual truth**. We live our lives according to many virtual truths. One good example is that the sun rises in the east and sets in the west. **True reality** informs us that the earth is rotating around the sun and creates the virtual truth or illusion that the sun orbits the earth. We have many virtual truths because our lives have been guided by our perspective from our ego self. Shinran admits that he is unable to correct his many false views (**virtual truths**) because of his *bombu*, limited self-view. Yet, even with our ego-centric view of life, we have been granted human life in this time of comfort and convenience. All this has been

gifted to us by the efforts of others. As Shin Buddhists, we identify these gifts as the compassion of Amida Buddha. Amida Buddha represents **true reality** or reality as it is.

We are aligning to **true reality** every time that we can admit that our ego-centric view (**virtual truth**) has caused us a problem. Most members of our US Congress seem to be unable to realize that their one-sided solutions are actually **virtual truths**. **True reality** is a balance and includes segments from all sides. Letting go of our deeply held virtual truths is difficult to do. For decades, I was afraid that others would discover that I didn't know as much as I pretended to know. More recently, I discovered that by admitting that "I don't know" relieved me of so much discomfort. Most people didn't care how much I knew and accepted me for being myself.

Beyond the ridged protocol (virtual truth) of the Hongwanji staff, the Gomonshu offered the true reality of his relationship with us sangha members. His visit to our temple provided the opportunity to discover that we are family, not just Shin Buddhist acquaintances. If I, as a common person, can be related to this historically significant icon, then I must also be related to so many others. The Dharma inspires us to include acquaintances as part of our family. In the refuge of our temple sangha, we can lower our personal shields to realize our true reality of Oneness.

The Gomonshu shared that he was particularly impressed with the Mexican dinner that our sangha provided. Our newer Mexican families and our older Nisei Mexican-born members and everyone in between made it possible to provide an authentic Mexican dinner that he appreciated. The Gomonshu's visit was like the wedding where we discovered that our former friends were actually part of our family. I thank the entire sangha family for their superb effort in making the Gomonshu feel at home.

It is in families and in sangha where we learn to live with those whom we may disagree. The eccentric uncle or brother-in-law may be different but are family. The Buddha's Dharma helps us to see them as they may see us. Our old disagreements (virtual truths) might be discarded in light of our new vision of true reality. We are family.

Like many, I was in a trance and tearing up listening to him as he talked about his life growing up at his grandparent's chicken farm in New York, his close relationship with his grandpa and his journey as a 17-year-old freedom fighter foot soldier in the south. I have seen Rick at many Southern District meetings and National Council meetings but never knew of his involvement with this group.

He spoke in detail about getting beaten by police while helping a black person who had fallen, beaten so bad that he had no recollection of being taken to a hospital. He awoke to a caring voice of the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King. I was glad to hear that the work of the freedom fighters did eventually enabled Blacks to vote. I thought it was so interesting that his work as a lawyer and his background in civil rights brought him to the West LA temple where he interviewed a woman who had been a prisoner in camp. After hearing her story, she left and he started to sob. He was comforted by someone we knew and loved and that was Rev. Akira Hata (who was the resident minister there) and was told everything will be OK. This was his Ah-ha moment when he started on his Buddhist path. I thank Mr. Stambul for sharing his stories with us.


