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Two Aspects of Deep Mind

By Rev. Dr. Kenji Akahoshi, Last month, I referenced "happiness" and "bliss" as a convenient means to describe two levels of awakening. "Happiness" can refer to a state

of common experience of everyday life. "Bliss" may be used to refer to a higher spiritual state. I intend to use these words to explain a basic idea in Shin. The 18th or Primal Vow presents the truth of the "two aspect of deep mind." The first aspect is that a person is completely incapable of reaching any level of spiritual insight. The second aspect states that a spiritual truth is completely assured. Although these two actions seem contradictory, the two aspects are working together. Let's see if we can clarify this fundamental idea and why it is important.

At the time of the Buddha and even now, it is easy to see that people who renounced ordinary life to become monks and nuns were choosing "Bliss" over the mundane level of "happiness." Since they had no material possessions, family, nor social status, the higher level of spiritual "bliss" was the obvious goal. So, what is the objective of a Shin Buddhist life?

Shinran's integrity and intuition is validated by modern psychology that it is almost impossible to release our attachment to our ego. Shinran points out that we are using our ego to diminish our ego desires. This contradiction can be compared to a person lifting himself up by his own bootstraps. The result would be to fall over. As Shin Buddhists, we admit that our ego remains in all of our actions and thoughts. This is especially true for ordinary people who have not discarded their material and social needs. This point substantiates the first aspect of being incapable of achieving any level of spiritual awakening.

There may be thousands of lay Buddhists who use Buddhist practice to achieve "happiness." And many may claim to be close to "bliss." But can the ego-self reach a point of no-self? This is where the second aspect of deep mind asserts its truth. Spiritual truth is always present and therefore, we are assured of its presence.

The Sanskrit words Amitabha and Amitayus are combined in the Japanese word Amida, which means Light and Life. Let us use two other elements to represent this idea. Let us use light and air to represent Light and Life, respectively. We know and accept that light and air are always present, although not seen. They are vital to our lives. We do not have to achieve any practice to benefit

from these elements. We are constantly receiving their benefits. A shortage of either one can cause us suffering and problems.

Amida represents the spiritual level of <u>Light</u> and <u>Life</u>, <u>Wisdom and Compassion</u>. Like <u>light</u> and <u>air</u>, they are vital to our life and are constantly present. There is nothing that we need to do to benefit from <u>light</u> and <u>air</u>. We need only to receive their benefits. Acknowledging their vital gifts not only brings happiness, it provides "bliss." Realizing that our lives are supported spiritually, without any effort on our part, is a spiritual awakening. Reciting Namo Amida Butsu is our expression of gratitude when we awaken to this great gift of <u>Light</u> and <u>Life</u>, Amida's Compassion.

Many other sects of Buddhism have American followers who follow the monastic path of monks, but retain the lifestyle of ordinary people. They hope to loosen the attachment to self by self-effort. Shinran points this out in the first aspect as he admits that he is completely incapable of reaching any level of spiritual status. This mundane level may reach ordinary happiness, but not spiritual bliss.

However, the second aspect assures us that we are assured of awakening to this reality without our attempt to achieve it. Like the natural light and air, we receive it constantly. Namo Amida Butsu is our constant reminder and expression of gratitude for receiving these gifts. We receive these gifts even with our ego and personal possessions. It is precisely this idea of receiving that relieves us of the unattainable struggle to achieve this lofty goal. We ordinary people may awake to the same truth that a monastic monk may attain. We realize this awakening as a gift rather than an achievement. This state of "bliss" is provided by Namo Amida Butsu, Oneness with Wisdom and Compassion.

Since we still retain our mundane attachments, we may realize that our conventional possessions and lifestyle are actually on a spiritual plane. Last month I offered a connection: our cells-organs-bodies-communities-ecosystems-planets-solar systems-galaxies-universe-Tathagata. So, our everyday environment and interactions are part of a spiritual reality. It is our minds that determine which level that we feel we are in. Namo Amida Butsu can lead us to "happiness" on a mundane level and to the full level of spiritual "bliss."

Thompson, Kenji-Sensei and several other ministers received Tokudo and Kyoshi minister ordination together. Rev. Thompson would later receive her Kaikyoshi status as a full-fledged minister.

Following graduation from IBS, Rev. Thompson, and her daughter Serenity, now 15, moved back to Denver in August 2012 to rejoin the Denver Sangha.

In 2015, Rev. Thompson participated in the minister's Dharmathon session at the BCA National Council Meetings held in San Diego.

Having very strong ties with the Denver YBA, which she was a member of during her youth, Rev. Thompson accompanied the group on its Sunshine Tour, in 2017, to temples throughout California, which included a visit to BTSD.

Rev. Thompson will serve as one of six featured guest ministers who will speak at the 73rd Annual Northwest District Buddhist Convention, Feb. 21-23 in Seattle.
