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NO SELF -- WHOLE SELF By Rev. Dr. Kenji Akahoshi, Resident Minister

Happy New Year! This simple seasonal greeting might invite the question of how might we bring happiness into our lives? Let us see how life would look if we saw it from a completely different perspective.

The Buddha's Enlightenment was a resolution to the imbalance or suffering (duhkha) that pervades life. Happiness is a human quality that we can associate with the bliss that he experienced. So, we might use two words to differentiate two levels of awakening. "Happiness" can refer to a state of common experience. "Bliss" may be used to refer to a higher spiritual state. This is just an artificial and convenient means to describe aspects of his Teachings. After his Enlightenment, the Buddha pondered whether others could comprehend this profound wisdom. His Teachings offer Truth at many different levels as he described the method of upaya, or "skillful means of teaching." Nagarjuna used the metaphor of fingers pointing to the truth of the moon to indicate that the various means of teachings were not truth itself.

The intent of this New Year's article is to illustrate that the Buddha's Teachings indicate that our mundane concerns can only be resolved at a higher or spiritual level. Our mundane world is contained within the rule of duality. Every item is defined by its opposite: up/ down, inside/outside, black/white, right/wrong, myself/ other, life/death. The resolution is a balance of both sides which the Buddha noted as the "middle path." Since the solution includes both elements, it is considered to be on a different or higher plane. Consider any sporting event or legal proceeding. It takes a referee or judge who is above the dueling sides to determine a solution. How might this work on our daily concerns?

The aspiration of the Buddha is to resolve the existential questions of sickness, old age, and death. His Enlightenment revealed that the depth of awakening had to involve a higher plane. His insight revealed that the universe is bound by the two factors of impermanence and interdependence. The truth of impermanence reveals the change and deterioration of all entities. The truth of interdependence reveals that everything is connected. What seems to be independent entities are actually smaller components of a greater whole. Thus, individual cells are part of larger organs. Individual organs are part of a body. Individual bodies are part of a community. Individual communities are part of an

ecosystem. Individual ecosystems are part of a planet. Individual planets are part of a solar system. Individual solar systems are part of galaxies. Individual galaxies are part of a universe. What comes next?

What comes next might be called the spiritual. The Buddha called it thusness, emptiness, or dharmakaya. These words point to the truth of existence. Just as individual cells comprise a body, our individual bodies comprise our world. Essentially, our individual bodies are part of a spiritual reality. Our usual concern is for the maintenance and future of our individual bodies and minds. However, our resolution or awakening realizes that a spirituality flows through all things. Are we individual bodies that seek some spirituality or are we spirit inhabiting physical bodies? We are like most other animals if we think that we are simply bodies that are somehow infuse with life. However, if we accept that we are spirit that has been gifted with human bodies, our entire perspective of life changes. I think the Buddhism and many religions are advocating this second idea.

This is a difficult concept to accept, especially since our physical bodies are tangible and the spiritual world is illusive. But the impermanence of our bodies is hard to deny. So, the idea of individual souls is a solution of some religions. However, a universal soul might define a Buddhist interpretation. As ordinary people, we are anchored with our thought that our ego-self is true and real. However, as Buddhists, we are encouraged to experience this truth that "no self" is actually "Whole Self."

This is not to say that we are Buddhas. But as cells are part of the body, the self is part of the whole. Namo Amida Butsu can mean that I am held by immeasurable light and infinite life (Amida Buddha). Interdependence reminds us that we are connected to the infinite past and infinite future by this spiritual thread. As humans, we have the unique capacity to awaken to this truth of being spiritual beings. Wisdom and Compassion are characteristics of the spirit that can be expressed by our bodies. Meaning, joy, and bliss come to us when we are in this state of awareness. Spiritual can mean that the physical loss of a loved one can be countered by the continued connection on a spiritual plane. Let us expand this thought by following Shinran's teachings in future articles. Gassho

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NEW YEAR'S GREETING FROM HONGWANJI

Happy New Year, everyone! At the beginning of this New Year, I would like to extend my best regards to you all.

Last year again, following the year before, Japan, as well as many other countries in the world, was struck with multiple natural disasters. I would like to convey my deepest condolences to those who lost their lives through those disasters and express my sympathy to everyone affected. In addition, we must never forget that armed conflicts and terror attacks as well as severe starvation is making it difficult to live, and lives are being lost every day.

Last September I had an opportunity to make an official visit to the temples of the Buddhist Churches of America as Monshu for the first time.

This allowed me to complete the first round of visitations to all of the overseas districts which include Canada, Hawaii, South America, and the US mainland.

Although every temple and district has its own history and background, many of the overseas Jodo Shinshu temples were established and have been cherished by the Japanese immigrants and their descendants. Reflecting on how sincerely our predecessors entrusted themselves to the Buddha Dharma and how importantly they thought of their temples while facing many difficulties such as World War II, I cannot help but feel grateful and even awe for their tremendous efforts as well as many other wondrous circumstances that have allowed the Jodo Shinshu teaching to be handed down to us today.

However, a considerable amount of time has passed since the Japanese emigrated overseas, and the lifestyle of their descendants, as well as the world situation have changed greatly. In accordance with these changes, quite a few people who are not of ethnically Japanese origin have also come to appreciate the teaching clarified by Shinran Shonin, and attend our overseas temples.

What caused this is nothing but the universality of the Jodo Shinshu teaching that transcends time and space. In other words, Amida Buddha's compassion equally reaches and nondiscriminately embraces everyone in the midst of all sorts of pain and agony.

In this year, let us continue to listen to the Dharma, considering it is directed to each one of us, and keep moving forward to share it with many other people as possible.

昨年も日本をはじめ世界各地で多くの自然災害が起こりました。災害によってお亡くなりになられた方に謹んで哀悼の意を表しますとともに、被災された方に心よりお見舞い申し上げます。また、これら以外にも紛争やテロ・飢餓などによって、日々多くの方が犠牲となり、困難な生活を送っておられることも忘れてはいけません。

さて、昨年9月に、門主として初めて北米開教区を訪問させていただきましたが、これによって、カナダ・ハワイ・南米・北米の全開教区を門主としてお参りさせていただいたことになります。各開教区、また各お寺によって、その歴史や現在の状況は異なりますが、多くのお寺が日本から移住された日本人の方とその子孫によって建立され、護持されてきました。第二次世界大戦をはじめとする様々な困難な状況にあっても、み教えを依りどころとして、お寺を大切に護ってこられた先人の方々に思いを致すとき、今日の私たちにまで浄土真宗のみ教えが受け継がれてきたことの尊く、また不思議なご縁をとても有り難く思います。

一方で日本人の方が最初に海外へ移住されてから相当の年数がたち、日系人の方々の生活も大きく変化し、また、時代状況も大きく変わりました。そのような中で、親鸞聖人が説かれた浄土真宗のみ教えは、日本人や日系人だけではなく、世界中の多くの方に伝わり、各開教区においても、様々な方がお寺へ来られるようになってきました。それは、浄土真宗のみ教えが、時代や場所を越えた普遍的な教えであるからです。すなわち、様々な悩みや苦しみを抱えるすべての人々を包み込み、摂め取ってくださる阿弥陀さまのおはたらきが普遍的であるということです。

本年も自分のこととしてみ教えを聞くとともに、多くの方にみ教えが伝わるよう努めて参りましょう。

EXTENDING A HEARTFELT THANK YOU FOR ANOTHER SUCCESSFUL MOCHITSUKI

A threat of inclement weather did not dampen the spirits for the annual mochitsuki. After an early drizzle before sunrise, balmy weather brought warmth, some blue skies and a lot of energy as the temple held its traditional Japanese cultural event of making mochi (sweet rice cakes) for the new year on December 8.

The temple wishes to thank everyone, from the youngest Dharma School student, to the young-atheart, community friends and students from various high schools for a fun day of making mochi.

We cooked 850 pounds of mochigome (sweet rice) which produced 1,275 pounds of mochi. Much of the workday began at 6 a.m. The final batch of cooked rice came off the steamer at 12:30 p.m.

With the addition of new equipment, including stove burners and three new mochi machines from Japan, production improved, making the cooking more efficient, a bit faster and producing great-tasting mochi.

There were many stations where volunteers jumped in and helped. The men-folk steamed the mochigome. Many of the young people, and experienced pounders helped grind, turn and pound the mochi. Many ladies, and a few men, cut and shaped the mochi into small circular morsels and, also prepared the larger kasane mochi. Volunteers cooled the mochi, preparing it for packaging. It was then weighed and bagged at the packaging station. Bags were then delivered to the sales/pick up area where volunteers assembled the orders and passed out the 2020 BCA calendars.

For the last five years, students from various high schools and colleges have volunteered their time to assist with the mochi-making production. Many students from Canyon Crest Academy, Torrey Pines High, Scripps Ranch High and Madison High participated in the event.

Thank you to volunteers who washed rice on the Friday before mochitsuki. And, to the crew who set up the equipment on a rainy Saturday.

Many thanks to the volunteers who provided lunch for the hungry workers. The variety of food was outstanding! Thanks to many folks who brought their favorite lunch dish and desserts to share.

Thank you to customers who purchased both ko-mochi and Kasane.

Arigato Gozaimashita! Thank you to everyone for all of your efforts.

An extended thank you to the BWA for selling their brittle, popcorn and craft items for the holiday season. To Kaytee Sumida for taking care of the White Elephant sales and Kris Tokunaga for her Tupperware and seasonal holiday sales.




Buddhist Education News in January

About Rinban Noriaki Ito

The **Reverend Noriaki Ito** was born as the first son of Rev. Horyu and Kazuko Ito in Kumamoto, Japan in September 1948. He came to the United States with his family in April 1955, settling in the Boyle Heights area of Los Angeles where his father was serving as Rinban (head minister) of the Los Angeles Higashi Honganji Betsuin.

He received his elementary and secondary education in East Los Angeles, graduating from Roosevelt High School in January 1967. In September of that year, he enrolled at Occidental College in Los Angeles. In June 1971, he graduated with a BA degree in Religious Studies and a minor in Asian Studies.

Following his graduation, he moved to Kyoto, Japan in September 1971 to enroll at Otani University. In December of that year, he received tokudo ordination at the Higashi Honganji headquarters.

In March of 1975, he completed his studies, receiving a Master of Arts degree in Shin Buddhism. He also received kyōshi, the teaching credential.

With his orders from the headquarters to serve as an overseas minister (kaikvōshi), he began his duties as a full-time minister at the Higashi Honganji Los Angeles Buddhist Temple in September 1975.

In June 1988, he was transferred to the West Covina Higashi Honganii to serve as resident minister.

In November 1993, in conjunction with the 90th Anniversary of the Higashi Honganji North America District, he returned to the Los Angeles Betsuin to assume the position of Rinban (head minister of a regional headquarters temple).

He concurrently serves as Director (Bishop) of the Higashi Honganji North America District and of the Shinshu Center of America.

Rev. Ito currently resides in La Crescenta, California. He is married and has three children.
