



# We the people...

Happy 4<sup>th</sup> of July. My last two Sunday Dharma talks focused on the signs, 'Mind the Gap, in London's underground (subways). This cautions riders about the space between the train and

the platform. This term could also warn us about the gap between words and experience. Words represent things or ideas. Words may have a meaning for immature minds and a different one for mature minds. Experience and education can provide a deeper meaning of words. The constitution's preamble, "We the people," has expanded with our maturity.

The idea of a democracy was the fundamental principle supporting the birth of this new nation from the colonial dominance of the English monarchy. Basically, this is a declaration to move from the minority rule of the elite to the majority rule of the group. However, success of this system relies on the experience and education of the group.

The point of this article is to challenge the thought that differing opinions about a subject are based on equal merits. My previous experience as a dentist may demonstrate my point. I gave the same dental health and maintenance information to all patients. Some patients listened, followed my advice, and had minimal dental treatment. Others did not follow good dental hygiene advice, rarely returned for hygiene maintenance, and consequently required more dental treatment. These people thought they were saving money by avoiding routine dental care. But the results were poor dental health and more expensive treatment. Avoiding dental maintenance does not save money.

The world is in the midst of a pandemic. Our community is experiencing a rise in the infection rate. All of the medical and health experts have provided advice on minimizing the spread of infection. Those who have not followed these instructions are discovering their susceptibility to the corona virus. And significantly, they are infecting others and preventing businesses and the economy to return to some semblance of normal. Opening businesses early and ignoring safety measures does not help the economy.

We may recognize that this behavior of noncompliance is typical of teenagers. I spoke about our "inner teenager" a few weeks ago. Psychologists tell us that most of us have parts of our ego that are stuck in childhood or teenage responses. When stressed or challenged, we act out these immature behaviors. On many issues, one side presents a mature view and the opposing side demonstrates an immature, teenage view. Issues are complex and are only segments of larger issues. Experience and education afford a deeper, broader perspective. History provides many examples.

British imperial rule succumbed to the democracies of America and other colonies. Slave holding states surrendered to a union of all free people. Women are allowed to vote. Each of these events demonstrated America's progress toward defining the term "We the people." July 4<sup>th</sup> symbolizes America's declaration to grow beyond an immature, teenage view. Experience and education have expanded the term "We the people" from a few elite white land-owners to include people of all races and gender.

The Buddha and Shinran have been encouraging us to awaken to a world of interconnected equality which includes the spiritual realm. Wise, mature masters have elaborated these truths over centuries. Yet, many of us react like teenagers and ignore the truths that can help us both in our daily interactions and our deeper spiritual issues. When Shinran talks about our *bombu*, ignorant self, he is referring to our teenage mentality. We are offered the guide to true happiness in the Dharma.

There is a gap between the way the words are presented and how we hear them. There is a difference of time (flat earth/digital universe) and culture (feudal Japan/ commercial America). It is important to have a conversation to clarify the essence of Shinran's message. At Buddhism 1-2-3, we are discussing the subjects of how Shin Buddhists might respond to the issues of the COVID-19 pandemic, "Black Lives Matter," and global warming. These issues affect our lives now and the lives of our children for decades to come. Please come join us. To connect with Zoom, contact the temple via email for the weekly connection.

I don't think that it was Shinran's dream to have his followers merely attend Sunday services and support fundraising activities. His purpose was for us to hear the Shin Dharma so that our lives would be directed toward gratitude and joy. His words and the Buddha's Teachings are so necessary today. If the teachings do not seem relevant, it is not because of the teachings. It is our teenage minds that discount them.

Please use this time of isolation to bring any question to our group or to me personally. The fundamental question at our death bed is not about death. The question is about life and whether it was lived. Don't wait. Let's find out now.

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### **TEMPLE CLOSURE ENTERS FIFTH MONTH**

On March 15, the temple campus shutdown due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Since that date, 20 in-person services have been canceled, including the Spring O Higan, Hanamatsuri, Gotan-E and O Bon/Hatsubon major service observances. Funerals and memorial services have been put on hold. Weekly temple-sponsored activities including Buddhism 1-2-3, taiko, minyo and tai chi have been inactive. Recently, Buddhism 1-2-3 began conducting its sessions remotely through Zoom. The monthly Introduction to Buddhism, community BINGO and Wednesday crafts have not been held.

In addition, the temple had to cancel its Spring Furniture Sale, Golf Tournament and this month's Bon Odori that takes place in the parking lot. The Japanese Cultural Bazaar, which would have been held on the first Sunday in June, has been tentatively moved to October.

Cancellation of community events, which BTSD supports, including the Japanese Friendship Garden's Cherry Blossom Festival, JCC Keiro Kai, Memorial weekend cemetery services, Japan Society of San Diego and Tijuana Beer and Sake Festival, San Diego LGBTQ Pride Parade and Balboa Park Bon Odori have all been affected.

The Board of Directors, committees and affiliated organizations have not had in-person activities for nearly five months.

The crisis has caused the temple adjust to a new norm.

All religious and social activities, and meetings are now being conducted via the internet remotely on Zoom or on YouTube.

Temple leaders and the affiliated groups are meeting to work on a strategy to support the reopening of the temple. When that reopening occurs is unknown but the temple must diligently prepare for that day.

Volunteers have been spending time at home making masks and face coverings. Such a nice gesture now that masks are mandatory to wear in public.

During the closure, business hours are 9 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Tuesday through Friday with Linda Redenbaugh happy to serve you. There is limited staff coverage on weekends. The temple is closed on Mondays.

The Temple affairs/Executive board met via zoom and the group outlined a plan to have four sub committees work on the re-opening needs of the temple. The committees are Activities, Dharma School, Religious, General Building and Operations. Their task is to determine needs such as signage, dividers, flow, PPE to name a few. The requested information is due mid-July and then will be reviewed and the policy will be developed as we follow the CDC, local, state and national guidelines. Stay tuned for more information.

On June 24, I was able to watch part of the governor's briefing and he was saying the State had the most cases in one day (over 7000 positive cases). However, he did say they are watching percentage of hospitalizations and ICU capacity. They are also keying in on the counties that are showing increases that may become hot spots. San Diego County's briefing today is also reporting one of the highest count (over 300) in one day but luckily the 13 triggers are holding steady with slight increases on a couple of the key points on the dashboard. I feel confident that our local and state leaders

are in the know and all had a common thread in their messages despite their political party. They all say the virus is not gone, wash your hands, wear a mask and have physical distancing. I think these are the best practices that will get us through this pandemic.

Formalizing this type of participation was needed because of the stay-at-home orders and meeting group size restrictions with the current pandemic.

### DHARMA SCHOOL NEWS


