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The Wholeness of Truth

Summer is here. We are at one extreme of the global season. When it is too hot, we wish for the coolness of winter and so we seek buildings with air con-

ditioning. Remember when we were in the depth of winter and wished it were warmer? We turned on a heater to warm up. Most things in life are experienced as a balance of two extremes. This difference in quality is called duality. As humans, we evaluate things in relation to the opposite. Hot is opposite to cold. Up is in relationship to down. Good needs bad to be valued. Life has meaning when compared to death. I sense myself as opposed to others.

In Tannisho, Yuien states that Shinran reminds us that we are incapable of really knowing good or bad. He says that only the Nembutsu is true and real. By this, he means that in a dynamic universe, causes and conditions occur without qualities of judgement. Volcanoes create new land masses. Glaciers move granite and mountains. Rivers carve valleys. Life forms consume and create other life forms.

As humans, we choose what we determine to be favorable to us. However, this one-sided judgement also creates difficulties for us. To help us, the Buddha offers us the Dharma of truth to have us realize this complex dynamic. The 2nd Noble Truth states that it is this attachment to our ego-centric view that creates our discontent.

If we were driving a car and held the steering wheel only to the extreme right or to the extreme left, depending on our social inclination, we would simply go around in a circle. To go forward, a balance of both would be necessary. The Buddha's Middle Path is a truth validated through observation of the universe's natural course. It is not directed by our desires.

The difficulty of accepting this obvious truth is the cultural and religious influence that we have in the West in a perception that "good" is the ultimate and default choice. This results in the belief that life is good and death is bad. Yet, everything that is alive will die. There is also a belief that each being has a separate soul.

Let us contrast this with the Buddhist principles of interdependence and impermanence. Every person, being, and entity is a part of every other being or entity. Our present human condition is the result of billions of years of mineral, organic, and human evolution. The impermanence of

each life form is simply a change from one form to another as each life form gains its sustenance from other life forms. Energy in the forms of light, liquids, and gases are interchanged continuously with life forms. Amida literally means infinite life and immeasurable light (energy). Buddha (Butsu) indicates a consciousness. Although Amida Buddha is often symbolized and talked about in human form, "Amida" is a way of depicting the truth of existence. Namo Amida Butsu is our response as we become consciously aware that we have been given a rare birth in this dynamic, cosmic universe.

Of course, each of us is concerned with the quality of our own life. However, by reciting "Na Man Da Bu," we are reminded that my individual self is part of the greater self of a community. Together, we accept the pain of loss and celebrate the joys of life. As the gatha, "Ondokusan," relates, "the debt of gratitude I owe my Dharma teachers, I will express until my bodily form is finally shattered." It is this realization that I have been accepted, just as I am, in the world community. As Buddhists, we work for the welfare of all beings. "Na Man Da Bu" is saying hooray to all of life. Let us share this wonderful truth with others.

There will always be harsh conditions that we deplore and favorable ones that enhance us. Both are necessary to complete the whole. The truth of the Dharma is this wholeness, not the one-sided illusion of only good. Fake news and untruth can be identified when only one aspect is promoted. Truth includes all sides.

I recall my son being so disappointed with himself in baseball, because, as a batter, he could only hit the ball about half the time. He felt much better after I told him that the best professional ball players only hit the ball 1/3 of the time. Life doesn't have to benefit us half the time. The truth of a situation is reassuring.

"Na Man Da Bu" reminds us that the gift of human birth got us into the game. The victory is to awaken to reality.

"In a world of duality: up/down, inside/outside, good/bad, myself/others, life/death, I'm made aware of a universe of wisdom and compassion. Gratitude and joy are gifts of the Nembutsu."
