Thank You By Rev. Dr. Kenji Akahoshi, Resident Minister

BUDDHIST TEM PLE

I've traveled a bit in many parts of the world. And I've always said that the sunsets in San Diego are the best in the world. As these sunset views be-

come fewer for me, I know that I will miss them and the people of San Diego. These have been an incredible 8 years for Karen and me. I have been doing what I love best: to share the Shin Dharma. The response from people who hear the message fulfills me in what I consider my purpose in life. I thank the San Diego sangha for fulfilling me.

It has been easy for me to relate the Shin Dharma with others, as I am simply sharing my own life experience. I had the very good fortune to be born in a family that was rooted in generations of Shin tradition. Because of my parent's close and active participation at the San Jose Buddhist Church Betsuin, I became familiar with many of the wonderful ministers who served there.

It was the character and attitude of those ministers and the sangha members friends of my parents that inspired me to look more deeply into this teaching of wisdom and compassion. It was also serendipitous that my college and young adult years were spent in the San Francisco Bay Area. The most competent teachers of philosophy, psychology, Eastern thought, and wholistic personal growth were available with their progressive ideas. I took advantage of learning from the best.

I became intimately involved with several teachers and their respective communities. However, no matter how famous or masterful these Western teachers were, they could not match the authentic character of the ordinary Shin follower. These modern masters replicated only segments of the complete package of Shin Buddhism. My anchor and center have always been the Shin Dharma. And I was able to use the methods of these new teachers that were effective with contemporary Americans.

It is simply obvious that the lineage from the Buddha, the masters, and Shinran had infused the Shin ministers with a substantial and proven teaching. However, the methods of conveying this truth have not always been very effective. Former bishop, Rev. Yamaoka correctly stated that an educational process was necessary to promote Shin in America, since we lacked the cultural background found in Japan. The Six Aspect of Endowed Shinjin is Rev. Yamaoka's contribution to this process. What the San Diego sangha has allowed me to do is to utilize innovative teaching and practice methods in conveying the essence of Shin thought. I have been doing this in bits and pieces since the 1980's as a Dharma school teacher, discussion leader, conference organizer, and retreat and workshop leader. I try to improve on methods that work and eliminate those that don't work. This is not an alternative form of Shin teachings. Instead, I offer it as a beginning step for those who may not have any background in Buddhist or Eastern thought

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I have found that these introductory techniques work. Interdependence is better described as ME within the WE, rather than the dualistic "self-power vs. Other Power." Shin practice is understood as receiving rather than achieving. Our awakening is a crosswise leap, as a sideways movement provides a different perspective. This shift from "please" to "thank you," allows a practice of awakening that is not self-promoting. I consider these simplistic techniques as *upaya* or a skillful means of teaching.

The experience of the Nembutsu is at the center of the Shin Dharma. I am simply sharing my own process which I received from the many Shin ministers who have been so generous in their life work. Although scholarship is important, my deepest education has come from the ordinary Shin follower whose ordinary lives reflect the deep values we all seek. San Diego and other Shin temples are flushed with them. It is helpful to listen and to hear the words of the Buddha. As the minister, I may provide the words of the Buddha. However, to see these truths in action, it is best to observe the sangha. Often it is difficult to spot, because much of this goes on unseen in the background. We are reminded that the temple is supported by the efforts of others.

The words of *Ondokusan* remind us that we have a debt of gratitude to the Buddha and teachers. With all the great teachers who have shared their wisdom and their compassionate actions toward me, it is only natural that I share that teaching with others.

Karen and I thank the sangha for showing us the living Dharma in the ways that you support the temple. The Nembutsu wakes us up daily to the Pure Realm of ordinary life. Namo Amida Butsu.

The Akahoshi's signed the flag as Kenji was born on the way to Amachi and Karen was born in the Minidoka internment camp. Gogo, a Santa Clara County Superior Court judge, will donate one flag to the Japanese American Museum of San Jose in commemoration of Fred Korematsu Day on January 30, 2022.



About Bishop Harada

Harada Sensei grew up on a family farm in Eastern Oregon and attended the Idaho-Oregon Buddhist Temple in Ontario, Oregon. But most of us know him for his long tenure at the Orange County Buddhist Church from 1986 to 2020. There he established programs that set the standard for how Temples could further the Dharma. As preparation he studied long years in institutions and Temples to fully prepare for his ministerial career. He has a B.A. degree in Religious Studies from the University of Oregon and M.A. degrees in Buddhist Studies from the Institute of Buddhist Studies and Ryukoku University, Kyoto, Japan. He enriched his studies by attending the Chu-o Bukkyo Gakuin for two of his five years in Kyoto Japan.

And before that, he studied under Rev. Gyomay Kubose, at the Buddhist Temple of Chicago, to learn more and learn deeply about the Dharma.

Prior to becoming our Bishop, he
