

Becoming Everyone The Truth about the World Rev. Jundo Gregory Gibbs

Last month I spoke with you about trusting in the Buddha's promise to make us fellow Buddhas. The month before I spoke about becoming our foolish selves, and the humility that this involves. Writing for the August edition of the Bussei Script I want to speak with you about becoming, ... everyone.

To see yourself in others, is, to an extent, to become them. Who else should I become besides the guy from Fresno I remember myself as being; some guy from Fresno? Well, everybody else or nobody else. Not some finite number of lives qualitatively similar to mine.

I believe that the Buddha and his most adept students saw everyone they met as their other selves. I never liked the modern Buddhist diminutives "Dharma Brother" and "Dharma Sister". We are closer to others than picturing them as siblings actually honors. For a Buddhist each person we meet is our other self. We are each subjectivities whereby the universe knows itself. Processes through which life sees itself. You are the homeless man vomiting on the street. You are the squirrels playing their mating

games in the trees. You are the brown bear lumbering down the path. However, give the brown bear space, as he may not see it that way yet.

A Buddha sees you as his/her/ their other self. This seeing-as-oneself is what I am, here, calling - becoming the other person. With thorough Awakening we will, indeed, see every-



one as our other-self, as intimately part of our own life.

The old Carl Sagan version of the universe is close to the multidimensional universe Buddhists have usually imagined. Either we are awakening subjectivities of this universe, as Carl saw it, or not. If we are, then we are everyone. Including people with different political and social commitments. Including people who have a different aesthetic sense. But this is the only multiverse, or multidimensionality of our world that a Buddhist could accept. A complex, multi-dimensioned world where, as John Lennon put it, "you are he, as I am he, as you are me, as we are altogether." The truth, as we come to see it is that as we grow in wisdom and compassion, - We become everyone.
