

Dangers Pale Before the Buddha's Support Rev. Jundo Gregory Gibbs

Our lives unfold amidst a balance of forces. Our own bodies contain conflicting drives and systems with variant priorities. If you exercise much, even when it is very cold, your legs still want to take a walk. Your trachea and lungs will want you to stay home. [Your trachea should win this argument]. Last month I reveled in Taylor Swift's positive take on karma. She's right that for very good people, or for ordinary people who rely on the Buddha's Vow, 'karma is a relaxing thought'. However, this is only one aspect of our situation.

For philanthropists and Buddhists reliant on Amida's Vow Power, karma is our bestie. How about electromagnetism? Much of our lives depend on electromagnetism but that force does not care if we suffer or enjoy our lives. Electromagnetism powers much of our comfort and enjoyment in this life, but it is dangerous. The singer for the Yardbirds, Keith Relf, was killed trying to rewire an electric guitar.

When our karma flows into Amida Buddha's, then, indeed, "karma is a cat purring in my lap because it loves me." How about gravity? Gravity does good things for us. It is crucial to keeping proper bone mass and muscle tone. As a guy who turns 75 this month, gravity also presents challenges. If Kareem Abdul Jabar can fall and break his hip, I had better be careful. It's all the same to gravity. Improve my bone density and muscle tone? Gravity is happy to help me with that. Break my hip if I am incautious and fall, that's fine too so far as the force of gravity is concerned.



The Buddha cares about us. The movements of Vow Power enacting his promises to us, pick us up and carry us where we need to go. The Buddha and the resources of Buddhist tradition are never a danger to us. Only goodness, kindness and acceptance flow into our lives from the Power of the Vow [Hon Gan Riki]. Many forces bear upon us in our daily living. There are social pressures, family expectations, work-related priorities, there are illnesses circulating, there are dark political movements in our country. This can all generate more fear and anxiety than we can readily cope with. But there is the Nembutsu. "Namo Amida Butsu" is the calling to us of Goodness Itself. There is the Promise of the Buddha that we can ride to our true, genuine and best destination. All the dangers and irritants pale before the Buddha's support. Say the Name, in forms like "Namu Amida Butsu." Trust in the manifestation of goodness through the Buddha's Vows. Trust in the goodness of life. ... But do beware of the dangers.

TEMPLE PLANS DAY OUTING TO IMPERIAL VALLEY CEMETERIES, JAPANESE GALLERY

On Saturday, May 25, the temple will make its annual visit to the Imperial Valley and the Sangha is invited to participate.

Services at the Calexico, El Centro and Brawley cemeteries, along with a visit to the Japanese Gallery at the Pioneers Museum in Imperial are scheduled.

The Sangha is encouraged to engage in the activity to understand the connection between the Imperial Valley and San Diego regions, both rich in Japanese and Buddhist history, and very profound with spreading the Jodo Shinshu teaching.

For over 60 years, BTSD ministers have provided spiritual support to the Buddhist communities in the Imperial Valley by conducting services twice a year at each cemetery during the Memorial Day weekend and for O Bon. Due to the July summer heat, the O Bon cemetery visits were discontinued about 12 years ago.

At the turn of the 20th Century, the Japanese population in the valley was growing. Buddhist temples were established in the 1920s in Brawley and El Centro (the Buddhist Church of San Diego was established in 1926). The churches served families in the region and surrounding communities.

When BTSD's Amida Buddha altar was destroyed in an arson fire in 1943, the El Centro church donated its center onaijin to San Diego when it closed its doors in 1948. BTSD is indebted to the El Centro Buddhist Church for the gift, a centerpiece that is respectfully appreciated each day.

Following the cemetery visits and lunch, the excursion will take everyone to the Pioneers Museum. The museum is dedicated to all ethnic groups that have made an impact in the Imperial Valley. The Japanese Gallery is an outstanding exhibit and is a must see.

The cost will be \$25 per person for the bus. There will be a fee for the museum. If a minimum of 35 passengers for the bus is not met, carpools will be arranged.

Reservations for the activity are now being accepted. Please contact the office or sign up during your next visit to the temple. A detailed itinerary will be forthcoming.
